Parental Guidelines: Please read books to/with your child. Even if your child is already a reader, it is beneficial to spend time reading together to help your child become a fluent reader. Fluent readers have an appropriate rate, expression, accuracy, and comprehension. For greater understanding, as you read discuss the details of character, setting, problem, and solution. Also, encourage your child to make and explain predictions throughout the story. (Example: What do you think will happen next? Why do you think that?) You can also model making connections to the text. (Examples: Last week we baked a cake like the character in the story. Joseph forgave his brothers just like you forgave me. The character lives in Florida just like we visited Florida.)
